Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Policy

1. Aims

Our school aims to meet its obligations under the Public Sector Equality Duty (PSED) by having due regard to the need to:

- Eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation and other conduct that is prohibited by the Equality Act 2010
- Advance equality of opportunity between people who share a protected characteristic and people who do not share a relevant protected characteristic
- Foster good relations across all characteristics – between people who share a protected characteristic and people who do not share it. The protected characteristics are:
 - Age
 - Disability
 - Gender reassignment
 - Marriage or civil partnership
 - Pregnancy and maternity
 - Race
 - Religion or belief
 - Sex
 - Sexual orientation

Our school aims to promote respect for difference and diversity in accordance with our values:

<u>Loving</u> We are kind. We respect others. We feel safe. We are happy to be ourselves.	<u>Inspirational</u> We always do our best. We follow our interests. We experience awe and wonder. We keep on trying, even when things are hard.
<u>Fun</u> We find enjoyment in every day. We build happy relationships. We know what we like and what we dislike. We try new things.	<u>Educational</u> We are taught in a way that is adapted to us. We learn lots of new skills. We experience exciting learning. We share our ideas.

2. Legislation and guidance

This document meets the requirements under the following legislation:

- [The Equality Act 2010](#), which introduced the Public Sector Equality Duty and protects people from discrimination
- [The Equality Act 2010 \(Specific Duties\) Regulations 2011](#), which require schools to publish information to demonstrate how they are complying with the Public Sector Equality Duty and to publish equality objectives

3. Roles and responsibilities

The governing board will:

- Ensure that the equality information and objectives as set out in this statement are published and communicated throughout the school, including to staff, pupils and parents/carers
- Ensure that the published equality information is updated at least every year, and that the objectives are reviewed and updated at least every 4 years
- Delegate responsibility for monitoring the achievement of the objectives on a daily basis to the headteacher

The equality link governor is Gavin Cottrell. They will:

- Meet with the designated member of staff for equality annually, and other relevant staff members, to discuss any issues and how these are being addressed
- Ensure they're familiar with all relevant legislation and the contents of this document
- Attend appropriate equality and diversity training
- Report back to the full governing board regarding any issues

The headteacher will:

- Promote knowledge and understanding of the equality objectives among staff and pupils
- Monitor success in achieving the objectives and report back to governors
- Have "due regard" when making a decision or taking an action to whether it may have particular implications for people with particular protected characteristics

As the designated member of staff for equality, the headteacher will:

- Promote knowledge and understanding of the equality objectives among staff and pupils
- Meet with the equality link governor annually to raise and discuss any issues
- Identify any staff training needs, and deliver training as necessary

All school staff are expected to have regard to this document and to work to achieve the objectives as set out in section 8.

4. Eliminating discrimination

The school is aware of its obligations under the Equality Act 2010 and complies with non-discrimination provisions.

Where relevant, our policies include reference to the importance of avoiding discrimination and other prohibited conduct.

Staff and governors are regularly reminded of their responsibilities under the Equality Act – for example, during meetings. Where this has been discussed during a meeting, it is recorded in the meeting minutes.

New staff receive training on the Equality Act as part of their induction, and all staff receive refresher training annually.

The school has a designated member of staff for monitoring equality issues, and an equality link governor. They regularly liaise regarding any issues and make senior leaders and governors aware of these as appropriate.

5. Advancing equality of opportunity

As set out in the DfE guidance on the Equality Act, the school aims to advance equality of opportunity by:

- Removing or minimising disadvantages suffered by people that are connected to a particular characteristic they have (e.g. pupils with disabilities, or gay pupils who are being subjected to homophobic bullying)
- Taking steps to meet the particular needs of people who have a particular characteristic
- Encouraging people who have a particular characteristic to participate fully in any activities (e.g. encouraging all pupils to be involved in the full range of school societies)

In fulfilling this aspect of the duty, the school will:

- Publish attainment data each academic year showing how pupils with different characteristics are performing
- Analyse the data referenced above to determine strengths and areas for improvement, implement actions in response and publish this information
- Make evidence available identifying improvements for specific groups (e.g. declines in incidents of homophobic or transphobic bullying)
- Publish further data about any issues associated with particular protected characteristics, identifying any issues which could affect our own pupils

In addition to the information about pupils, we will consider how our activities as an employer affect staff with protected characteristics. As a school, we will publish information (where appropriate) to show:

- The make-up of our workforce, with breakdowns of staff at different grades, levels and rates of pay (including any patterns of occupational segregation and part-time work)
- Gender pay-gap reporting and other pay equality issues
- The profile of staff at different stages of employment including recruitment, training, promotion and leavers.
- Applications for flexible working and their outcomes for staff with different protected characteristics
- Applications for learning and development opportunities and their outcomes for staff with different protected characteristics
- Grievances and disciplinary issues and complaints of discrimination and other prohibited conduct
- Policies and programmes in place to address equality concerns from staff
- Information from staff surveys and/or trade unions

- Records weighing the equality outcomes of important decisions including evidence used to make decisions

We will make sure that with any data we publish to show how we meet our equality duties, individual staff or pupils will not be identifiable. This means we may not publish some data if it relates to a very small number of staff or pupils to preserve their confidentiality.

6. Fostering good relations

The school aims to foster good relations between those who share a protected characteristic and those who do not share it by:

- Promoting tolerance, friendship and understanding of a range of religions and cultures through different aspects of our curriculum. This includes teaching in RE, citizenship and personal, social, health and economic (PSHE) education, but also activities in other curriculum areas. For example, as part of teaching and learning in English/reading, pupils will be introduced to literature from a range of cultures
- Making pupils aware of our behaviour and anti-bullying policies
- Holding assemblies dealing with relevant issues. Pupils will be encouraged to take a lead in such assemblies, and we will also invite external speakers to contribute
- Working with our local community. This includes inviting leaders of local faith groups to speak at assemblies, and organising school trips and activities based around the local community
- Encouraging and implementing initiatives to deal with tensions between different groups of pupils within the school. For example, our school council has representatives from different year groups and is formed of pupils from a range of backgrounds. All pupils are encouraged to participate in the school's activities, such as sports clubs. We also work with parents to promote knowledge and understanding of different cultures
- We have developed links with people and groups who have specialist knowledge about particular characteristics, which helps inform and develop our approach

7. Equality considerations in decision-making

The school ensures it has due regard to equality considerations whenever significant decisions are made. We consider equality implications before and at the time that we develop policy and make decisions and continue to review these on a continuing basis.

The school always considers the impact of significant decisions on particular groups. For example, when a school trip or activity is being planned, the school considers whether the trip:

- Cuts across any religious holidays
- Is accessible to pupils with disabilities
- Has equivalent facilities for boys and girls

The school keeps a written record (known as an Equality Impact Assessment) to show we have actively considered our equality duties and asked ourselves relevant questions. This is recorded at the same time as the risk assessment when planning school trips and activities. The record is completed by the member of staff organising the activity and is stored electronically with the completed risk assessment.

8. Equality objectives

As a school, we are required to publish equality information every year:

- We must report on at least 1 equality objective once every 4 years – we've chosen October 2027 to be our deadline for this

Objective 1

“To increase pupil, staff and governors’ awareness of legal duties around equality and what this looks like within the context of our school.”

To achieve this objective, we are:

Ensuring equality is referred to in policies and procedures.

Conducting assemblies to make explicit the equalities act when discussing mutual respect and tolerance.

Conducting annual staff training on diversity to discuss the legal framework

Using the *Cambridgeshire Primary Personal Development Programme*

Objective 2

“For all pupils to be appropriately challenged and engaged through well planned and managed classroom support.”

To achieve this objective, we are:

Ensuring that staff are aware of children vulnerable to under achievement and to reflect this in their planning of TA support, adapting this to the needs of their class through reflective planning.

Putting support put in place which is identified in the provision mapping conducted at pupil progress meetings on a termly basis.

Objective 3

“To promote cultural development and diversity through a rich range of experiences”

To achieve this objective, we are:

Ensuring that staff use our curriculum vision as a stimulus for providing rich cultural experience that support our aim of decolonising our curriculum.

Providing enrichment days and opportunities within the curriculum to ensure they are familiar and are able to compare and contrast other practices and cultures.

Objective 4

“To narrow the gap between vulnerable groups of pupils and other pupils in the confidence, fluency, understanding and enjoyment of reading and writing. Why we have chosen this objective”

To achieve this objective, we are:

Fully establishing our Little Wandle phonics programme across the school, showing fidelity to the scheme and ensuring that no child is left behind.

Working with our local authority to ensure that our writing planning and provision is high quality, ensuring success for all.

Ensuring that expectations for all children are high in the eyes of the teaching staff and that support is put in place for all children to be able to feel successful in English.

9. Monitoring arrangements

The headteacher will update the equality information we publish, described in sections 4 to 7 above, at least every year.

School-specific equality objectives will be reviewed by [governing board / name of committee of the governing board / individual governor / head teacher] at least every 4 years.

This document will be reviewed by our link governor for equality annually, to ensure continued compliance with the PSED.
